Gary Rance 15/7/14 By Rob Sheehan



After a quick practice piece to demonstrate the correct use of various tools, Gary showed us how to turn pendants. Mounting

a pre-drilled blank between centres. Gary used a spindle roughing gouge to turn the wood down to size He then used a 3/8" spindle gouge



to round over the edges and sanded the face 120 grit to 600 grit. Mounting the piece on a jam chuck, Gary turned the

reverse face and sanded as before. Gary also creates pendants with offset holes using a home-made offset holder (see his DVD). A small hole

drilled at the top takes a split ring and a leather cord. A nice box helps with the sale.



Garv's next project was



earring stand (based on an idea by Keith Rowley). Gary uses a metal drilling jig to set out 24 holes around the

circumference. The pre-drilled centre hole allows the piece to be held on the jig and also allows it to be mounted on a jam chuck on the lathe. Gary rounded over the edge and turned a gentle ogee shape on the face.. He then used the point of a skew chisel to add two decorative lines. The lines were filled with black pencil to make them stand out. The base was turned in a similar way. For sale items, the base is covered in baize (never do this if entering the piece for a competition).




The stem was turned from cocobolo, a contrasting wood. Gary has a


scratch stock marked with the diameters required. The stem was turned as a single piece before being cut in two to form the stem and finial. Gary uses Titebond II glue to glue the



undercut spigots into the top and base. A coat of Chestnut spray lacquer seals the piece.



Using a spindle gouge or skew chisel, turn the blank to about 1 3/4". A plum is an egg shape with the widest point at the centre. After marking the centre, Gary turned an egg shape. An unexpected split in the wood was filled with superglue and sand-
