


John Evans and Tony Baxter Demo 1/4/2025

John did the turning, Tony told the jokes. It was a good evening's entertainment.



The blank started as a 45mm square by 270mm long. Mark the true centre A and, at the tail stock end, mark two holes offset 10mm from the centre, B left and C right, and one hole D, 5mm offset right from the centre. Mount between true centres A and turn to round. Leave the tail stock end large, to act as a base for the figure.



Turn a ball at the head stock end so the blank can be gripped in the chuck at an offset.



Mark a line 160 mm from the tail stock end, then 42 mm, then 19 mm and another at a further 19 mm. On true centres A, taper the legs down from 20mm at the waist down to 5mm at the foot.

Sand and finish the leg section. Once moved, there is no going back to finish this section.



Move the tail stock end to position B. Do not apply too much pressure as the foot section is quite weak.



Taper the waist section down from 20mm at the bust, to 5mm at the waist. Round over the bottom into the narrow waist. Sand & finish.



Move the tail stock end to position C. Turn the neck down to 5mm. Round the bust down to the neck. Sand & finish.

Move to poision D (5 mm offset). Turn the head to a cylinder 13mm in diameter. Round the head down to the neck. Sand, finish & part off.



The completed body. The block at the base is left on to act as a stand.



Turning the hat. Depending on the style of hat, this blank may be a similar size to the body blank or slightly larger. Turn to round and drill a hole that is a snug fit for the head.

Shape the brim and the crown. Sand and finish.

Glue on the head at a jaunty angle.

"How to" - turn a Lady's Head.


If you can turn a ladies head at your age you are doing very well, I have to resort to chocolates and wood!

I first saw Brian Partridge turn this figurine about 10 years ago at a demo we held in the hall, and thought if an excellent off centre exercise. Since then I have simplified the 'haw to' part and developed my own way, once again it may not be your way or the best way, but it works for me. It should be turned in conjunction with the drawing and can be scaled up or down as required. I have turned one 450mm high.

Proceed as follows - good luck

- Cut the blank to length to include a ball shape just above the finished head profile of a diameter to suit your chuck, about 20mm suits mine. Whilst its in the square mark the exact centre on the head end. The foot end should be marked as per drawing.
- Mount between true centres and turn the ball shape above the head. Remount in the chuck gripping on the ball and the true centre of the foot end, and now turn up to the 20mm diameter hip area. You must sand and apply your finish as you progress there is no going back.
- Slacken the chuck and move the work piece to the opposite (left hand) 10mm offset on the tailstock, tighten the chuck and turn the body section, again sand and polish.
- 4. Slacken the chuck and move the work piece to the opposite (right hand) 10mm offset on the tailstock. Tighten the chuck and turn the shoulders and neck portion. Take care to leave the smallest possible radius at the section between the neck and the head as you only have 5mm off set to get the head profile right. Sand and polish.





 Slacken the chuck and move to the 5mm tailstock off set position. Tighten the chuck and carefully turn the head profile maintaining some shape between the back of the head and neck. Sand and finish.

Always be aware of selecting the best grain or feature in the wood to form the front of the figure

The first time I turned one I got the boobs and burn on the same side.

As he had finished the off centre figure demo early, John showed us how to turn a hedgehog. He said that these sell really well from the charity stall.

A Laburnum log mounted bretween centres. Turn to round. Turn a parallel chucking tenon.



Grip the tenon lightly in the chuck jaws. Raise the tail stock end by 6 mm and tighten the chuck. Turn the nose to 10 mm round and curve up to the body.



Round over the back of the body and part off. Draw on a mouth, eyes and eye lashes. Sand the base flat so the hedgehog will sit upright.


