Emma Cook 19/9/2017 By Rob Sheehan



Emma started by asking for a cup of tea. This was a theme to be repeated throughout the evening.

Her first project was a turned and carved pumpkin box made from Lime. She started by marking the centres of a 5 1/2" cube and mounting it between steb centres. Emma then used a spindle roughing gouge to turn it into a cylinder before using a beading and parting tool to put a chucking spigot on both ends. She then

put the top spigot into the chuck and marked the length of the top. This was over 1/3 the length to allow for a 1" stalk. Emma then parted off the bottom using a parting tool. Emma cut another spigot inside the lid and hollowed the lid very slightly to just above the spigot. Using a 1/4" spindle gouge with a very long bevel, she trued up the mating surface

between top and bottom to exactly 90°. This was important to get a good fit. She then put a little bit of decoration inside the lid.

Emma then mounted the base in the chuck, trued up the face and cut a recess to match the spigot on the lid. She then fit the top to the base and,



using 1/4"bowl gouge with one short and one long bevel, rounded over the top, leaving plenty for the stalk. Before shaping the top too much, Emma started to shape the base to get an overall shape to the piece. She then cut the stalk with a slight undercut so it can easily be gripped. After refining the overall outside shape, Emma removed the lid and hollowed out the centre with a Simon Hope 10mm TCT cutter on a square bar (this holds the cutter at exactly 45°).

Emma then cut the pumpkin's grooves, first using a Henry Taylor fluter (U-shape end), followed by a flatter gouge. As with turning, carving is done by starting at the high point and cut downhill, twisting the gouge slightly to slice the wood. The stalk and face were also carved. Her advice

was to keep the mouth and eyes well away from the opening (else it may crack when reverse chucked) and keep the mouth a simple smile as teeth involve a lot of carving. Finally, Emma reverse chucked the base to remove the chucking spigot.

Emma's second project was a carver's mallet in Beech. The grain was positioned across the bed of the lathe. Starting with the mallet head, Emma cut a chucking spigot at both



ends and shaped the head round at both ends, with the widest part about 3/4" to 1" from the top, and tapered to both ends. After drilling a 25mm hold down the centre from both ends, Emma decorated the top. She then turned the handle, making it protrude 10mm from the head and only long enough for the user's hand size to the wrist bone. Any longer and the mallet can't be used properly. She also cut a thumb notch so that, without looking, it is always oriented to hit with the end grain.
