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Editor's notes

If you have visited the Axminster store recently, you will have noticed that our Tractor & Trailer are missing from the display. They have been loaned to the AWGB for their travelling exhibition. They first appeared at the Yandles show at the beginning of September. Then they go "up North" for several shows, including Harrogate at the end of November. Congratulations to Brian and his team for producing such a worthy piece of turning. Brian has currently replaced the Axminster display with three other pieces, a half scale version of the Tractor & Trailer, an Ant-shaped jewelry box and an Angel. Personally, I think these make an even more impressive display.

I've managed to do a little bit of turning myself. An octagonal platter in spalted beech was looking good until it got a bit thin in the centre. Finding a matching piece was impossible, so the plugged hole does stand out a bit! My magic wand pens drew some attention at the National Forest Wood Show over the bank holiday. I was there handing out catalogues for Axminster, and doing a little bit of pen turning at the same time. A few familiar faces turned up!

My pen turning demo on Saturday at the Axminster shop was rudely interrupted by a power cut. A thunder storm overhead cut the electric to the whole area. We managed to keep serving by torch light, until the power was restored an hour and a half later.

Guy Ravine 17/7/12 By Rob Sheehan

Thanks to Guy for taking over from Ken Allen who was unable to come through illness. Guy started by turning a spindle test piece in beech. He turned the lower part to round using a bowl gouge. Guy then used a skew

chisel to create a v-cut between the square pommel and the round section. Guy said that you can also use a 3/8" beading and parting tool to create a squarer shoulder, or use a (Bill Jones) point tool or use a skewchi gouge. He then demonstrated the use of the skew chisel for planing cuts and also for fine




detail. Guy said that a skewchi gouge is easier to use for begin-

ners as there is less chance of a dig in. Guy also demonstrated the skewchi gouge and the point tool.

Guy's next project was a finial in blackwood. As before, he turned the blank to round using a bowl gouge, and created a 1/2" spigot on the end. Guy tapered the top and added some - but not too much detail, to the remainder. Guy said it is best to view the finial in the upright position to see if the balance is correct..



Guy's next project was to show us how to turn a 21mm spherical ball without the use of jigs. He started with a sycamore cylinder 72mm in diameter. After marking and cutting the length of the ball (72mm same as the diameter), Guy then did a bit of maths to mark the next target points on the ball. Diameter 72mm x 0.293 = 20.51 (use 21mm), so Guy marked two lines 21mm in from each end and also marked a ring 21mm in from the diameter. He then cut between the points.



The next set of cutting lines were marked $72 \text{mm} \times 0.18 = 7.7 \text{ mm}$ either side of the new bevel cut. Guy then cut from point to point leaving a rough sphere. He then rounded over the remainder, leaving two spigots at the head and tail ends. After parting off the ball, Guy used a cup chuck at the head and tail ends, mounting the ball between them so that the spigots were roughly vertical.



When the rough ball rotates on the lathe, it leaves a ghost image where it is not quite round. Guy then scraped away at the ghost images until a very presentable sphere was produced.



Guy's next project was a tealight holder in sycamore. He created a dovetail spigot to mount the piece in the chuck and faced off the top. After marking the diameter of the tealight, Guy used a spindle gouge to hollow out the top. He also made a hole in the centre of the hollow so the piece could later be mounted between centres. Guy then used a small bowl gouge to form the shape. The black bands at the top and bottom were burnt in using a narrow parting tool.

Guy's final project was a natural edge bowl from half a laburnum log.

After mounting the log between centres, Guy used a small bowl gouge to cut from the centre outwards. However, the finishing cut was done from the outside in towards the centre to preserve the bark. Guy used an Eli Avisera scraper to smooth the outside. After mounting the base spigot in a



chuck, Guy proceeded to hollow out the centre. He finished off by mounting the piece between centres again and removed the base spigot.

Alan Truman 21/8/12 by Rob Sheehan

Alan's project for the evening was an octagonal scalloped pomander bowl done in three stages - bowl, lid and finial. He had already prepared the bowl blank by cutting the 8 scallops on a bandsaw. Alan had also

prepared the lid by part drilling the pomander holes. A second set of prepared pomander blanks was kindly donated to the club as a raffle prize.

Alan mounted the bowl blank on a screw chuck and used a bowl gouge to flatten the bottom and create a chucking recess. He then shaped the base into a gentle curve and added some decoration to the centre of the chucking recess. Alan power sanded from 120 grit to 240 grit, followed by two coats of Chestnut cellulose



sanding sealer (thinned 50/50) and finished with Briwax applied with 0000 wire wool. This was buffed up using a soft cloth.

Alan then mounted the bowl on the chuck and flattened the top. He marked the size of the bowl approximately 3/4" in from the scallops. Alan



hollowed out the centre, resharpening his gouge before the last cut. He then power sanded to 320 grit for a better finish for the inside. Two coats of sanding sealer and Briwax



were used to finish the inside of the bowl.

Alan's tip - before removing the bowl from the chuck, rotate it 1/8th of a turn in the jaws and re-tighten. This removes the little dimples of wood between the chuck jaws.

Alan then mounted the pre-prepared pomander lid on to a screw chuck. This was turned to round and flattened. He then measured the diameter of the bowl and transferred this measurement to the top. Alan cut a spigot

just larger than this measurement and reduced its size until he got a "relaxed" fit with the bowl. The lid was then sized to be less then the inside diameter of the scallops. Alan turned a bead on the edge of the lid using a point tool and finished with a spindle gouge. He then hollowed out the centre of the lid. The inside needs a chucking recess. This is better than relying on the central hole being parallel enough to reverse it on to a screw chuck from the inside. The inside



of the lid is sealed (to stop smells penetrating) but not polished. Alan



mounted the lid on the recess and proceeded to turn the top of the lid into a gentle curve. Using a homemade sanding drum, Alan sanded the holes. He also used a cotton bud to seal and wax them.

Alan then turned a finial/handle out of yew. The hole in the top of the finial made

by the tailstock was filled with pencil lead. This makes it look as though it goes right the way through. The hole in the bottom of the finial was filled with a decorative ball. Alan used carnuba wax on the finial to give it a shinier finish. He said a finished item would sell for about £25. Other good woods to use are yew and laburnum. A light top and darker base also works
